Not for 300 years have so many people worked from home and the revolution in how we inhabit our homes and offices in addition to the biggest changes to our planning system since World War II with Boris Johnson's mandate to 'Build, Build, Build,' looks set to make architecture one of the liveliest topics to come.

For our opening Symposium we are joined by leading minds from the fields of Architecture, Interior and Garden design to consider how creative solutions are adapting to contemporary concerns, discussing everything from ways to make your home a place for work to ideas on converting high rise offices into dwelling places. Not very long-ago high streets were houses and the state of retail spaces will also be discussed.

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As part of Architecture 2020 we highlight the beauty of the architectural model with a focus on examples that illustrate the narrative within our symposium. One of the highlights will be the installation of “Presences” a 6m high and 4m wide interactive architectural model from Niall McLaughlin Architects last seen at the Architectural Biennale 2018. Alongside is an extensive exhibition of models designed for artists’ studios, galleries, arts schools and libraries by leading architects including Invisible Studio/ Piers Taylor, Jenny Jones, Matheson Whiteley, Feilden Fowles, Peter Clegg, vPPR, Stiff + Trevillion and Niall McLaughlin.

The exhibition is set against the backdrop of our own installation: the recreated Studio of Dame Elisabeth Frink set within our 13th Century barn, and memorial to her creative process.

The symposium programming begins with interior designer Emily Todhunter discussing the ways to transform your home in accordance to the new demands made on it, followed by Sue Stuart- Smith on the powers of gardening for mental health.

The discussion continues the following week with talks from interior designer Jane Churchill and writer and historian Suzanne Fagence Cooper on Jane and William Morris’ Red House house in Kent that revolutionised how Victorian houses were furnished and pioneered ideas of ecological sustainability.



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Saturday is headlined by two panel discussions one before and then after lunch: *A Place Apart* followed by *A Place Together*, which develop on from Frink's statement about her studio as a solitary practice environment away from others and then contrasting in the afternoon with a discussion about collective spaces and how these have are requiring new ways of being imagined as we continue to want and indeed need to find *places together*.

Notes for editors:

In 2019 Messums Wiltshire acquired 'the blue door studio' Elisabeth Frink built in the grounds of Woolland in Dorset. Working with the Estate and Frink's archivist Annette Ratuszniak we have reconstructed her studio and compiled a range of original artefacts to recreate her working environment as the first stage in its repurposing of the building first as an educative vehicle for her work in plaster and then as a venue and source of inspiration for a new wave of artists working in the South West.

The installation, which in part is a celebration of one of this country's greatest female artists, also considers active creative spaces in their own right. Set inside the oldest and largest thatched building in the country, the installation reflects on the making process and forms backdrop to our architectural survey of creative spaces.
